As we begin the season of Lent perhaps we could do something different this year and instead of **giving up** something for Lent, maybe we could **give** something, by following the example and teaching of our Lord.

In His teachings Jesus told us to, **‘Love your neighbour as yourself...’** (Mark 12:31) and remembering from the story of the Good Samaritan just exactly who our neighbour is, maybe this is a good place to start. Easter Services

We will be having a Maundy Thursday Communion Service in the Abbey Church at 7.00pm on the 29th of March and a Good Friday service in Bendochy Church at 7.00pm on the 30th of March. All are welcome to come and join us for these Holy Week services. Then on Easter Sunday, the 1st of April, we will have an Easter Day service in Bendochy and a Family Easter Service in the Abbey Church at the usual times.

Bible Study - Esther

The book of Esther is a graphic narrative telling how the people of Israel were saved from destruction after an evil plot devised by Haman. The author is unknown, although some believe it could be the work of Mordecai, the uncle of Esther and the other main character in the book, or even Ezra. It is set around the Fifth Century BC during the reign of Ahasuerus (probably Xerxes I) sometime between 485 and 465 BC.

The Persian are now the dominant force in the Middle East having conquered the Babylonians. It is now about 50 years since Cyrus, the first King of that empire issued a decree allowing the Jews to return home (around 538 BC). The return home though was not the exodus many anticipated and over the next 25 years only around 50,000 return to Judah. During this time Ezra began the rebuilding work on the Temple, but opposition from non Jews frustrated this from the very beginning down to the time of King Artaxerxes, the successor to Ahasuerus. After this, with the arrival of Nehemia and more exiles, around 422 BC, the work began again during the reign of Darius II. (The prophets Haggai and Zechariah were also prominent around this time.)

The book of Esther is set right in the middle of these troubled times, (around 483 - 471 BC) where the Jews, although now free to return home, were still seen by many as the enemy and a threat to their way of life. Their allegiance to God and their desire to rebuild the Temple lay at the heart of this fear. And so Haman devises a plot to destroy them.

Read Esther 4:1 - 5:8 and 7:1 - 8:8

What do we learn of Esther in these chapters?

- ◇ She was courageous - risking her life in coming before the King as she did.
- ◇ She was also selfless - realising that the safety of her people was more important than her own life.
- ◇ She was humble before God - realising that despite her position as Queen, she still needed God's help.
- ◇ She was faithful - despite the decree that had been issued, she refused to despair or wallow in self-pity. And she came to believe that perhaps God had placed her in that position for just this purpose.
- ◇ She gave God the honour He was due - worshipping Him by fasting for three days and nights before seeking to go and see the King.

What does the story of Esther teach us today?

- ◇ God is always in control - even when the situation appears dire, God is there and we need to trust Him and come to Him in prayer to seek His help and intervention.
- ◇ God will place people in specific places to help carry out His will. Deliverance comes only from God.

Interestingly enough, the name of God never appears anywhere within the book of Esther. Yet it clearly demonstrates the sovereignty of God and His loving care for His people and shows how, safe in the knowledge that God is in control, we can all exercise courage in difficult times. *It also shows that when we unite our purpose with the purpose of God, we can expect great things to happen.*

Butterybank Community Woodland Update Jan 2018

This is a good time to reflect on the past and plan for the future. 2017 was probably the best year so far on Butterybank, with several developments which have contributed to woodland establishment. With almost 800 trees; including oak, rowan, birch, larch and fruit trees, most have outgrown their collars and will be increasingly obvious - to traffic returning from Blairgowrie passing Couttie bridge!

In early spring enthusiastic volunteers planted 3000 sponsored bulbs near the Butterybank Road entrance and these will help provide undercover, encourage biodiversity and soften tree lines. Crocuses, snowdrops and daffodils also make the woodland more attractive, contributing to our annual February Snowdrop festival.

Later spring saw the installation of our first sponsored Information Panel at the top of the site alongside the cairn. Overlooking Strathmore, it provides an interesting visual display outlining the geology, geography and history of Butterybank. This goes back beyond the time when the Cistercian monks owned and managed the site, and the kirk is still called the Abbey! Even local visitors have little knowledge of this unique field, which offers a stunning panoramic view.

FCA's MAD squad also installed poles and fencing at the bottom of the cemetery on the path through to the old railway line, to ensure pedestrian safety since motor bikes have been a hazard from the beginning. Sadly this safety feature was vandalised and removed before Christmas, which again demonstrates anti-social behaviour. Butterybank has faced - and will continue to face - such issues, which challenge Coupar Angus and beyond. Community users will have to take more responsibility for managing Butterybank and monitor and report incidents to the Community Council or the Police.

Other problems include sign vandalism and destruction, tree theft, collar cane, branch breakage and removal, as well as anti-social dog fouling and litter - despite the presence of litter bins and notices at all 4 entrances. Approximately 50 trees have been inevitably lost to drought, waterlogging, or the unwelcome feeding by hungry rabbits and even more voracious voles. Between encouraging wildlife and minimising damage from weeds pests and diseases, it is a difficult balancing act on Butterybank. For example we had to wage war on weeds like (poisonous) ragwort, hogweed and docks, which threaten to smother vulnerable young saplings. Other than that, a wide range of flora and fauna is rapidly establishing already after only two seasons.

A solid bench seat and a couple of picnic tables are now installed at the flatter top of the field, where trees have not been planted and the grass is shorter. This is an important provision for visitors who either want to sit and relax or who are unable to walk down the slope safely. These were installed by Perth & Kinross Council who still own the field and have leased it to Forward Coupar Angus for 99 years at a nominal rent. These facilities extend the use and availability of Butterybank to a wider range of visitors and encourage families to enjoy the woodland as a leisure facility. Summer picnics in the sun and off-piste safe sledging in midwinter snow.

A new farm gate and stile were installed in mid-summer at the bottom entrance. This is due to the continued generosity of local farmer Peter Grewar, who also mows the field seasonally while I cut the paths. This reinforces the need for pedestrian safety, since all site visitors should have the right to walk through the woodland without fear of wheeled transport. Butterybank is a steeply sloping woodland not an off-road cycle & motorbike track, or park!

We had a visit from judges representing Scotland's Finest Woods during June, who enjoyed looking around Butterybank with us, but it was an unexpected surprise when they decided to award us a Commendation. Rona McKinnon and I were presented with a wooden plaque and certificate at the Royal Highland Show. Both plaque and certificate are now permanently housed in Coupar Angus Heritage Centre, where they belong. Although I have been professionally involved in agricultural and horticultural science for over 45 years, alongside my kirk ministry, this award meant a lot to me and is a personal highlight, as it was unexpected to be both regarded & awarded by professional woodland experts.

Another gratifying and unexpected development has been requests to plant memorial trees on Butterybank. Hidden secretly among the trees are now 13 trees which have provided comfort for grieving families in a quiet peaceful and reflective place. You can imagine both the tears and laughter involved in these simple but moving ceremonies and of course these special trees will continue to grow and be a living memorial. This was not part of the original plans, but illustrates how communities can contribute creatively and improve any project.

During the autumn term we continued to develop links with Coupar Angus Primary School, who have been enthusiastically involved in the project from the beginning. We set a competition for the 4 houses to design draft display boards for our second sponsored Information Panel, which will be more tree based, visual, interactive and child-led. The 4 houses presented their boards just before Christmas and Rona and I were delighted with their commitment, effort, and competence. Balgersho was the prize winner but our draft will incorporate as many of the imaginative ideas as possible, with completion and installation later this year. This leads us to the future of Butterybank - which will be largely in their hands as they grow up!

On this note, we have thought ahead for the next few years by preparing a detailed and financially sound Sustainability Plan, which we presented to a group of Butterybank enthusiasts in autumn. Whenever I have used the term 'we' I mean my fellow elves Rona McKinnon (aka Tinkerbelle) and Bill Ronald (aka Tinkerbill) since we 3 have largely guided Butterybank site preparation, planting and maintenance. Their unflagging support optimism energy and enthusiasm have kept me going. However, last year we reflected on our own futures and concluded that a community woodland must be supported and maintained by the community, and not rely on elves alone.

User Groups supporting BATTERYBANK include Forward Coupar Angus, Pride of Place, Coupar Angus Primary School, Perth & Kinross Council, Woodland Trust, Local Councillors, Scotmid, Mushroom Trust, Make A Difference, Gannochy Trust, Dundee Lions, Peter Grewar Farming and other valued sponsors. These groups are among the army of supporters without whom BATTERYBANK Community Woodland would never have been developed. Continuing sponsorship will be needed to fund any future developments. Our sponsors to date have been wonderfully generous with both cash and in-kind offers, and we are appreciative of their essential contributions. Woodlands are not free. Woodlands are hard work. Paths need cutting. Trees need maintaining and replacing.

As BATTERYBANK Project Convener I have overseen, directed and managed the preparation and establishment of the site since 2014. I have now stepped down as Convenor since my work is complete, though I shall obviously continue to contribute if needed. To that end, another User Group meeting was held in January to clarify their future plans, tasks and inputs. The future of BATTERYBANK will be safe and secure providing these groups co-operate and communicate and I have every confidence they will.

The members and friends of Bendochy Congregation were shocked to learn of the death of Rob Cormack on the 28th November 2017.

Rob was an Elder, Fabric Convenor and Health and Safety Convenor at Bendochy and he played an important and valued role in the life of the church. His boyish enthusiasm and commitment were infectious and his support for others unwavering. He performed all tasks with meticulous attention to detail and exemplary thoroughness. Rob had a strong faith.

He was a highlander, born in Wick in 1940, where his father was a vet. He attended Wick High School and George Heriot’s before studying engineering at Edinburgh University, where he graduated with honours. Rob worked as a civil engineer until he fully retired aged 68. He specialised in the demolition of buildings and bridges, recycling and land reclamation. Rob initially worked in the public sector with Ayr and Argyll District Councils and Strathclyde Regional Council before moving to the private sector.

He met Marie in 1963 at a students’ charity dance and they married in 1966. They had three children; Peter, Jamie and Dorothy but, sadly, Jamie died in an accident. Rob was loved by his children and grandchildren.

Rob and Marie lived in the west of Scotland until they moved to Blairgowrie 11 years ago. Rob enjoyed living in Perthshire and he participated in local activities. He was a cheerful and effective president of Blairgowrie Probus Club and a very diligent church elder. He was a knowledgeable gardener and a keen reader, particularly of history. He enjoyed country dancing and travel and in early life was an enthusiastic cyclist.

Rob was a kindly, modest and thoroughly good man.

Pride of Place

Thursday morning 23rd November saw the opening event of the Coupar Angus Burn with the Provost and the P7s from Coupar Angus Primary school. This was not only an opportunity to give a focus to a project that has evolved over the last 3 years, but also for the whole community to work together. The area was fast becoming a dumping ground and now has the potential to become a fabulous wildlife area in the middle of Coupar Angus.



When the Britain in Bloom judges visited Coupar Angus in 2013 they spotted the Burn and challenged Pride of Place to see if we could improve the biodiversity of the area, the variety of plants and to encourage more wildlife.

With the help of funding from Perth and Kinross Council, the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Leader Fund, plans were drawn up and work finally started in February last year. Pride of Place worked with the school children; encouraging them to make posters asking the community for sightings of wildlife along the burn, identifying the vegetation and learning about the historical links Coupar Angus has with the Clydesdale horses. The information gathered was displayed on the three Information Boards. The children then moved on to assist in writing a leaflet to encourage the community to realise what a fantastic resource they have in their town and encourage visitors to come and see. These are available from the library, Town Hall and the Heritage Centre.

The Men's Shed constructed the bench in the seating area and the bat and bird boxes that can be seen in the trees and already in use. The Make a Difference (MaD) Team set in place the bench and the three sign boards; the Wildlife Board in the seating area, the Vegetation Board along the burnside and the Clydesdale Board on the wall in Cuddy's Wynd. They also removed all the fly tipping from along the burn. We have had assistance from Community Greenspace and the Rangers working with the children.

Pride of Place have since been busy harvesting snowdrops and replanting around town; adding to those on the Common, at the Standing Stone and by



the seating area along the Burn. In addition, our volunteers have been litter picking and tidying up the spring bedding in the boxes and planters, getting the town ready for the Snowdrop Festival that starts on the evening of Friday, 16th February with the Pride of Place Snowdrop Family Ceilidh in the Town Hall. Full details are in the Snowdrop programme. This is always a very fun evening, come and join us.

The Snowdrop As A Symbol Of Hope

Over the last couple of weeks, I've noticed the snowdrops beginning to flower. Such a tiny flower- very understated, but one that seems to symbolize a sign of hope penetrating through last year's debris. I haven't always taken much notice of this flower, but that all changed, when I moved to live near Coupar Angus, and during the first Spring I was here I noticed along the verges these tiny flowers appeared like a white ribbon stretching from Campmuir into the town. When I heard the story of how they'd been lovingly planted by Mr French several years ago, I seemed to notice them more and more and became fascinated by their delicacy and beauty.

Several weeks ago, while I was looking online at other Snowdrop festivals around the UK, I came across an organization called the Snowdrop Project based in Sheffield. They have adopted the snowdrop as a symbol for what their charity represents. The charity works with people who've been caught up in human trafficking, which is a form of modern day slavery. The Snowdrop Project was born in May 2012 and became the first charity in the UK to specialize in long term support.

Why the Snowdrop Project?

A Snowdrop must overcome the harsh, cold realities of winter to bloom. Like the first flower of Spring, survivors of trafficking have demonstrated incredible strength and resilience to overcome the abuses they have endured and have the chance to start afresh.

Perhaps we don't experience results of trafficking here in Coupar Angus, but the message of the snowdrop emerging through such a harsh environment can perhaps speak to us all in our own individual lives.


