#### Bible Study-Read The Book of Jonah

#### Background Information :

Jonah came from Gath Hepher in Galiliee and was the son of Amittai. He is believed to have been a prophet during the reign of King Jeroboam II during a time of expansion in Israel (around 790 - 750 BC) and we read in 2 Kings 14:25 that he was a messenger of mercy to the King at that time. His deeds at that time were not fully recorded, nor indeed were any of his prophecies, save this one, probably written around the latter half of the eight century BC. But even in this book named after him these is only one line of prophecy, 'Yet forty days and Ninevah shall be overthrown...' The rest of the book is a narrative of the preface to and the consequences of that prediction.

Ninevah was the capital of Assyria, a power that was rising in the Middle East at that time, an enemy of Israel that was for ever invading and raiding towns and villages in the North of Israel, an enemy that was to eventually overthrow Samaria and the Northern Kingdom of in 722BC. They were reputed to be utterly ruthless as a conquering army and although they were shown mercy by God on this occasion, the city was eventually destroyed in 612 BC and never again inhabited.

So what does the book tell us about Jonah and what lessons can we learn from this today?

#### Lets look at what God asked Jonah to do and what he actually did.

- God asks Jonah to go and preach repentance to the city of Ninevah on account of their wickedness.
- He asks him to go to a city 500 miles Northeast of Palestine, on a journey over fertile land, a journey on which God would be with him all the way.
- Jonah heads some 200 miles to the West, on a distasteful sea voyage, seeking to flee form the presence and power of God as far as He possibly could.

#### Why would Jonah do this?

- Was it simply fear? Given the reputation of the Assyrians and the fact that they were considered to be enemies of Israel, perhaps this is understandable.
- However, we see later that Jonah was no coward as he was prepared to choose death himself rather than let the others on the boat drown on his account.
- Or was there something else? Was it more a question of hatred rather than fear. Did Jonah despise and hate the Assyrians so much that he longed to see God destroy them?
- Later on, again we do have some indication that this might have been the case. Jonah knew that God would be merciful if the people of Ninevah did repent and he clearly didn't want that to happen.

#### What does all this say about Jonah and what does it teach us?

• Jonah wasn't just simply ignoring or avoiding God's will, he was deliberately opposing it as best as he could. However, God's will, will be done.

# What do we learn from the incident involving the sailors throwing Jonah overboard and him being swallowed by a large fish?

- In all of this the foreign sailors came to know of the power of God and came to fear Him and so they asked for God's mercy, asking not to held accountable for the death of Jonah if they threw him overboard and offering a sacrifice to God.
- That God will hear the prayers of all who come to Him and will be merciful.
- Jonah himself came to know that it was God who had saved him from death despite his sinfulness and offers Him a Psalm of Thanksgiving.

#### What is relevant in the story of Jonah being swallowed by the fish?

• The idea of the three days in a dark place of death before being given 'new life'.

#### What was the real significance of Jonah going to Ninevah at all?

• It shows that God is a God for all people, irrespective of race or nationality or background, and He will offer forgiveness and grant salvation to all who come to Him.

# What can we learn from Jonah's response to mercy being granted to the people of Ninevah?

- Jonah is still unable to fully comprehend the way of God and this displeases him.
- Sometimes there are things that happen in our lives or the lives around us that we cannot begin to understand. But we need to learn to accept that we are incapable of fully understanding all that goes on in the world today.
- Jonah has got things totally out of perspective. He is more angry about a bush which withers and dies than he would be about the death of all those in Ninevah if God had destroyed it.
- But deep down, in his Psalm of Thanksgiving, in verses 2:2, 6, 8-9, we see that Jonah knows he has been rebellious, that he deserved to be punished and that it is only by the grace of God that he was saved.
- We are all here today by the grace of God.

The spiritual implications of Jonah are powerful and obvious. In the author, a messenger of God, we clearly see how rebellious and stubborn we can all be at times in respect to the will of God. We also see the comparison between us as a judgemental, resentful people, and an all merciful, all forgiving God.

As to the question as to whether or not these events are historically factual or simply serve as an allegory or parable, we will never truly know. However, the fact that Jesus refers to Jonah in Matthew 12 and Luke 11, highlights the importance of the lessons learned here.

#### A View From The Pew

Recently I have read two books by Jim Cymbala, the Pastor of the Brooklyn Tabernacle in one of the most deprived areas of New York.

Nearly thirty years ago Jim and his wife Carol accepted this challenge given by Jim's father who had started this small church some two years before. It now had a congregation of around twenty. Jim had no theological training whatsoever, but his father said "You will just have to learn on the job!"

Now, two years later the congregation was still around twenty and they were needing to pay the rent, with nothing in the "till".

After praying about it with his wife, Carol, they decided they must meet with the whole congregation for a time of heartfelt prayer. This they did, with many tears. Do we close the church, sell the building, and pay the rent? Or do we cry out to God and see His guidance and perhaps be able to use this place His glory?

So, what was the outcome?

Now, some thirty years later the present congregation, spread amongst the 'planted' Churches number more than 6000, and there is constant prayer in the Church 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. Jim and Carol and the Associate Pastor are in no doubt that it's the fervent prayers of the congregations that God has honoured.

The Abbey has a prayer meeting every Wednesday afternoon and the average number attending with Andy is four or five out of the congregation attending the Church on a Sunday of "around forty".

That's probably twice as many as there were in the first two years of the Tabernacle in New York before they started to take prayer seriously!

Do you think we all should and could learn something from this?

#### Butterybank 2018 Summary

A New Year always gives us a chance to reflect on the past year of our lives. Butterybank Community Woodland is no exception. Both are unpredictable!

During 2018, virtually all the (800!) trees planted since December 2015 have now established and are into their 3<sup>rd</sup> season. Their tops now show well above the plastic collars which protect them from hungry rabbits. During winter, when the grass is not actively growing, herbivores chew bark at the tree bases. If the trunk is totally girdled, the tree will die during the next summer because of drought stress - notable during the hot 2018 summer.

Along with root rot diseases, about 50 trees on Butterybank have been lost since 2016 because of both rabbits and - surprisingly - voles, which have the cheek to burrow under the collars! Most losses have been in the central exposed sloping orchard and have been replaced. Generally c 5% loss of plantings can be expected and were allowed for - 50 out of 800 is acceptable.

Memorial trees continue to be planted in such a peaceful and beautiful landscape and there are now 21 on site for families to visit and remember someone special. Species chosen this year include apple, crab apple, pear, flowering cherry, hawthorn and whitebeam, which all add to the variety. It has been a privilege to co-ordinate these requests, and simple ceremonies combine both laughter and tears. Our Cistercian monks, who once owned the site and also planted fruit trees and willow, would surely approve.

The most recent was a pear tree planted by Coupar Angus Primary School pupils and staff as the finale of a 6 week autumn project. CAPS have been committed supporters to Butterybank from the beginning. Tragically, more are needed in 2019 after the recent horrific murder of one of my star P6 gardening pupils. Pupils and staff have shown admirable courage and fortitude.

The school will receive a prestigious John Muir award for cross-curricular activities on site. These included surveys, minibug hunts, art, poetry and reading as well as a fun day for all pupils. My highlights included 60 strong crocodiles of supervised P5 6 and 7 pupils along Bogside! The last session included the official opening of the new CAPS Information Panel, designed entirely by pupils. It was installed by the MAD squad near the side entrance on Butterybank Road. 650 copies of a map of the site and accompanying activity leaflet were sponsored by PKC and distributed to the school, Town Hall, High Street shop and local schools and villages. They have all been taken!

As with all projects, familiar problems continue to rear their head, notably antisocial vandalism, litter and dog fouling. The bottom pedestrian exit at the old railway end was totally removed & destroyed. The MAD squad came to the rescue - not for the first time - and installed a more robust entrance which has survived so far. Damage from motorbikes continued to be a problem and the Community Council dutifully record this and inform Police Scotland of all such incidents reported by residents and visitors. Safe pedestrian access, peaceful tranquility and wildlife preservation were also threatened by a Sustrans-linked cycle path through Butterybank. The proposal was withdrawn after residential protest.

Antisocial midsummer solstice partying resulted in about 20 trees, collars & stakes being damaged. POP volunteers rescued them in time for the Keep Scotland Beautiful visit in summer, which includes Butterybank in the judging route through Coupar Angus. Another POP gold award made it worthwhile!

Similar antisocial incidents occur in Larghan Park and elsewhere, reflecting a mindless minority. These do not - or should not - distract from our overall progress and increasing use of the woodland by responsible visitors. The side entrance kissing gate was also vandalised recently but quickly repaired. I try to avoid either social and moral judgements, which is easier said than done. Responses to these antisocial abuses on Butterybank should be proportional and preventative. From my point of view, all damage requires repair or replanting, regardless of the cause. Realistically, such antisocial behaviour anywhere is beyond our own control. Having invested so much of my own time into establishing the woodland, this is still particularly frustrating.

During the season, only POP volunteers responded to my open offers of mower and pruning training, which gives some hope for future maintenance. Seasonal tractor mowing the field by Peter Grewar and path cutting by myself are very time consuming. So is site monitoring. Have you ever considered who bothers to do this? The problem remains that few town residents contribute to site maintenance, which is the overall responsibility of Forward Coupar Angus via a Butterybank User Group. My days as site supervisor are supposed to be over - it's your woodland!

#### **Pride of Place**

As the 6th Coupar Angus Snowdrop Festival approaches the Poppers have been out harvesting snowdrops and now, as and when the weather is kind to us and ground soft, we are planting them up, adding to the thousands now planted in our town. If you look you will see that snowdrops are already beginning to appear along the road sides, in the park, on the Common and along the Burn. We have been planting alongside Clyde and in the Community Woodland.



This past week we started to tidy the polytunnel ready to receive the plug plants that will be planted up to grow on for the hanging baskets and boxes in town. The polytunnel needs to be 'bug' free so the new plants are not attacked. Some of the winter and spring plants in the boxes have not grown well so we will be tidying these before the festival. It is this time of year that we order the compost to be used for the baskets and boxes, the order for the plugs went to the suppliers before Christmas. Important work that cannot be seen but if not done no baskets or boxes.

Our Pollinators Bed by Clyde does not look very tidy at all at the moment but as it is the middle of winter the birds and are still looking for food, the seed heads can provide this and insects vital for our planet can find shelter here. As the weather warms in spring we will tidy up the flower bed, feed the soil and split the plants, with some replanting.



In the week before the Festival we will be out and about ensuring the town looks its best for visitors. We will be collecting any litter we find, so you could help by us by ensuring all litter goes in the bin please.

PoP will be having a Stall in the Abbey Church Snowdrop Fair on 23rd Feb. from 10am until 2pm, so come and see what Tracy has for you to try your hand at.

The date for our Family Ceildih has yet to be announced, so don't miss out and please look out for the date to be announced. Hope to see you there and do not forget we would love a few more folk to come and join us, be a Popper and help to keep our town looking great, meet on Thursday mornings at 9.30am at the Town Hall. A New Year, a New Start, so come and find out just what we do.

Park Watchers will have noted that the very tall Willow Trees behind the play area have been cut down to the size that they were originally intended. Our Green Ranger had advised there would soon be a danger of bending, and possibly breaking. Contractors, curtesy of Perth and Kinross Council, have cut them down to the intended height.

Our Green Ranger and a colleague are advising on plans to turn the area into a special play area for children. Long pieces of suitable Willow will be made into a fence and a 'dome' with tunnel will be made in the middle of the trees.



Any shortfall of Willow will be supplemented from our stock growing alongside the Coupar Angus Burn which we must also manage properly. We are grateful for the help and expertise of the Green Rangers and the volunteer work parties they have brought to help us; Wisecraft and Young Police Scotland. Management of this resource will enable us to have a regular fresh supply of Willow which can be used in craft work. Our PKC Green Rangers have already suggested amateur classes for making Christmas items later in the year, once we have cut a proper supply.

Work at the manse is now completed with a new garage door in place. However the Presbytery has just done a quinquennial Survey, and although this has not raisded any major issues, we will be looking to replace the rear garden wall decorative screen, which has deteriorated.

The report also noted no major items at the church, although it found a crack at the rear of the Session House (but no signs of subsidence). It recommended a planned maintenance of the external wall be considered. The recent leak in the roof has been sorted, and gutters etc checked.


Legal permissions etc for the development under the gallery are almost complete, so we are about to look for quotations for the work. If all goes to plan, actual work should be happening over the summer.
