

Bridges are metaphors for everything in life. The bridge is not just a structure for getting us back and forth over an expanse of water, it's also about connecting our communities.

When there's a need to calm down and allow things to come to you we decide to "cross that bridge when we come to it". When we want to let go of the opportunity to go back we say "we're burning our bridges".

When you physically walk a bridge there's the experience of being in between two places, but its only when you're on the bridge you have a distanced outlook on the land from both sides of the bridge.

Does God Have A Gender?

Silly question? Yes, but there are problems in answering this. Most ministers and theologians would agree that God is neither male nor female but if you are a fundamentalist Christian and believe that the Bible is absolute truth then it is quite clear God is a man just as Jesus is a man and even the Holy Spirit is referred to as "he." I have mentioned this on a previous occasion in connection with Sunday School. As we all know, children have inquisitive minds and in Sunday School we bring them up on the Bible so we have to have an answer to this problem.

I believe it is important not to sow seeds of confusion so, at this stage, I think children should concentrate on what the Bible says and not on matters of interpretation .Later on during those teenage years when young people are naturally sceptical about most things such questions can form the basis for healthy discussion.

When I was at school, for example, I learnt about the structure of the atom; it was a very simplified picture and later on I realised that it was a lot more complicated but, and this is the important point, it was a picture that I could understand at that stage of my education. I tended to think that science had all the answers and was always right because it dealt with facts and facts can't change. Well I was wrong, they can and do change as knowledge advances. Scientists do not have all the answers because science is full of uncertainties. Our old friend Richard Dawkins believes one thing is definitely certain, there is no God because there is no evidence but equally there is no evidence that there is not. Scientists like Dawkins, if they are going to be honest must be agnostics not atheists.

I am simply making the point that we should avoid being dogmatic about anything but if in doubt show a healthy scepticism and keep an open mind. As Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury once said, I don't know if God exists but I believe in HIM" Yes HIM.

Coupar Angus Abbey Church: Fabric Report August 2015

Work on checking the cross at the West gable finally went ahead and it turned out the cross was still very secure, but has now been straightened and the base pointed to prevent water penetration and any risk of corrosion of the shaft holding it in place. At the same time the builders checked the pointing on all the coping stones on both gables whilst they had the high platform on site, and cleared some gutters. The fixings for the West window grilles were checked, and some loose stone flakes removed.

Asbestos removal at the manse is due shortly, following which other works can be started.

Seeing The Wood For The Trees.....

Roz invited me to write something about the symbolism of trees, which I'm happy to supply - indeed this has been my theme for more than one (different!) sermon over the years. The Kirk was due for another update on Butterybank Community Woodland anyway.

On Friday December 4th a group of us in Forward Coupar Angus will meet on Butterybank in the morning to launch the first ceremonial tree planting. Having secured a long-term lease from Perth & Kinross Council on the basis of a design and management plan, I've invited one of my sponsors to plant an 'iconic' (ie special!) tree. The launch is primarily a celebration, in the presence of all those local & regional supporters who have helped me get the proposal started, including CART POP and MAD. We'll also plant a mini orchard in the middle of the slope.

Later on there will be a succession of plantings over the next 18 months or so, using indigenous small sapling trees such as rowan birch hazel oak hawthorn. These will be carefully sited and maintained to both protect views and create a unique woodland, neither forest nor park. These plantings will be open to all members of the community wishing to participate.

The launch is a celebration of more than 2 years preparation and negotiation, and perhaps the most important guests participating are 'my' P7 class from the school. I've worked closely with P7's from the beginning and it is for them, their children and grandchildren that the community woodland will gradually develop. So much for the update!

Woodlands don't really have a starting or finishing date, like most projects they simply evolve - much to the surprise of my sponsors who request this sort of information! This leads me to a conversation I had with Roz. I took on the project because I was asked to - probably because of my previous agricultural and horticultural career. Perhaps my initial focus was on the technical and practical side, but it was my students who taught me to lift my head up from the microscope and look at the bigger picture, leading to my involvement in landscaping - for which I am not trained! They introduced me to a more aesthetic appreciation of the environment via landscaping. They went on the gain Chelsea golds a generation ago, for which I am immensely proud. In October, they on the other hand, presented me and the three other POP committee members with (another!) gold for our Britain in Bloom efforts to improve Coupar Angus. You can imagine how delighted I was to catch up with 'my' student harvest and hear about their careers.

You are probably only too aware that trees of one sort or another have inspired countless generations across the world - poets authors artists sculptors musicians amongst many - to create masterpieces beyond the realms of science and technology. Some are quite breath-taking with a spiritual dimension. There's a pretty good smattering of trees in the bible too, many with deeply profound symbolism. That's your bible study challenge for December!

I wonder if you have a favourite tree, and why? I wonder if you have ever really looked closely at them, or watched one over the seasons and the years? My own favourite is the horse chestnut, because I grew one from a conker when I was a keen 7-year old cub scout, and nurtured it over my childhood and adolescence. The great great grandson of that conker is presently sitting in a pot ready to plant on Butterybank at the launch. My own iconic tree! Trees should have a good story behind them, and the ones at the top of the orchard area all have a tale to tell. How about you?

Believe it or not it was an early Cistercian monk form France - St Bernard - who said "Believe me, you will find more lessons in the woods than in books" - 30 years before our Abbey was founded! How right he was. Our vision for Butterybank is to improve an abandoned and neglected landscape and protect the environment in a unique location overlooking Strathmore. We should thank God we live in the jewel (!) of the Big Tree county. Watch the woodland grow and may you find a sense of contemplation peace and serenity there, alongside the cemetery where 5 of my much-loved family lie at rest.

Mission Partners

Mission Partners Malcolm and Cati Ramsay work for the United Mission to Nepal (UMN) in Kathmandu. Predictably, following the devastating earthquakes earlier in the year, life has been much more difficult for them.

In the October Partnerplan letter Malcolm expresses his frustration that £2.7bn, pledged by foreign governments and donor agencies at a conference in June, has remained unclaimed and unspent by the Nepali government body overseeing reconstruction in the country. The reason for this is because the politicians are finalising a new Constitution for Nepal!!

What would the earthquake victims rather have, a constitution or new houses and schools? The new constitution was finished in September and has caused a new set of problems. Malcolm does stress, however, that the UMN has been using money donated directly to them for the relief effort.

Cati writes that they continue their own work and are pleased to be welcoming more volunteers and their families to UMN and spend more time helping them to settle into a very different lifestyle and culture.

She finishes with a story about a big Hindu religious festival involving a giant wooden structure which is paraded through the streets. Unfortunately electricity and phone lines sometimes get in the way so they are just randomly cut down! This leaves everyone with no power and they resort to candles and torches ONCE AGAIN!

Questions Questions Questions!

I enjoyed Peter Barker's thoughtful article on the Trinity in last month's Isla Link. While simple analogies for complex theological mysteries may help us, chemistry and drama have their limits. My background leads me to botanical comparisons ... roots, shoots and leaves for instance, or a clover leaf, 3 in 1 and 1 in 3. Simple. Or is it? Maybe that's why I studied biology first and theology later!

Paradoxes of trying to comprehend the incomprehensible also apply to other foundation stones of our Christian faith, such as Baptism, Incarnation and Resurrection. Some of us, whether in pulpit or pew, prefer not to ask these curious and awkward questions, since they can may us feel uncomfortable and threaten to undermine our faith.

By contrast, some of us - myself included - prefer to follow their instinctive curiosity and explore the interpretation of the Word made Flesh revealed in Scripture. Peter mentioned crossword puzzles reminding me that 'easy' or 'cryptic' clues are not always either easy or cryptic, depending on your vocabulary and way of thinking, compared with the puzzle setter. Difficulties in scriptural interpretation may similarly reflect our use of language and interpretation of words.

Our language is a rich blend of Anglo Saxon, Gaelic, Norse, Germanic, French and Latin, amongst others. The New Testament was written in Greek and the Old Testament in Hebrew. If you are a linguist and wordsmith, you are capable of accurately translating words. Most of us are not! Our several 'English' versions have frequently lost their original meaning in the Greek and Hebrew texts, all of which are second-hand copies anyway, written long after Jesus' life.

This makes it harder to get to 'the truth' and still leaves us with riddles and enigmas, whether we're Christians or not. I believe the challenge is not to let this erode our faith. Trust in the only truth I know. Jesus Christ is God's Son and our Saviour. ICHTHUS if you want the Greek! The Greek word for 'fish' which explains the common use of a fish symbol in Christian history, as many of you will know. It's part of my URC logo, and I've secretly worn a fish badge on my lapel since schooldays.

I'm currently enjoying a series of challenging questions thrown at me in recent months by one of our congregation - perceptive questions which are tantalisingly impossible to answer. They cover a wide range of Christianity and 'Churchianity' issues. I can't offer any easy answers, but they do offer fruitful and enjoyable discussions. I wonder if you ever ask yourself any of these 'why?' riddles? Bible Study may seem a thing of the past, but it's everpresent.

Maybe that is why Jesus himself used 'simple' stories - parables - with hidden deeper meanings. Fish. Bread. Wine. Sheep. If it was good enough for him surely it's good enough for us. The very word 'mystery' is from Latin and Greek and means secret, or closed eyes and lips. Christianity is an open secret!
