Christmas Bible Study

During our Christmas celebrations in Church, there are traditional passages which are often read each year. The opening chapter of John's Gospel is one of those - often read on Christmas Day itself - and it presents Jesus to us in a way that no other verses in the Bible do. So why not take time over this Christmas period to reflect on this well-known chapter and discover afresh what these verses are saying to you.

Read John 1:1-18

What are the main three things that this opening prologue to John's Gospel touches on?

- It tells us exactly who Jesus is and why He came.
 - But who exactly is Jesus to us and what does it mean for us to know Him in our lives each day?
- It tells us of the relationship between Jesus and God.
 - ♦ How do we understand this relationship and where do we fit I to this?
- It hints that His mission will not meet with universal success.
 - Have we encountered and experienced this in our witness of our Lord and Saviour - and if so, how have we dealt with this?

What key themes are we introduced to in the verses, themes that will crop up again and again as we read through the Gospel?

- John speaks of Eternal Life rather than the Kingdom of God
 - Why is this significant for John and what is the difference, if any, between Eternal Life and The Kingdom of God?
- The 'World' is used not only when speaking about the created order, but also used in a way to depict those who do not accept the revelation of Christ.
 - ♦ The term 'Worldly Things' is perhaps one we hear often, but what does it mean and is that what John is speaking about here?
- Here, Jesus Himself not only reveals this truth, we are told He is the very personification of truth.
 - Observe the but on a day to day basis, what do we understand by this and how does it impact on our faith lives?
- Unlike the Synoptic Gospels, Jesus' death is the supreme moment of glorification.
 - Why is it important that we know this now?

What else can we learn from these opening verses?

- In a sense they are like a 'mini-gospel.
 - Verses 1-5 speak to us of the unity of Christ and God, a theme which we see throughout the fourth Gospel, focussing very much on the relationship between God and Jesus.
 - Verses 6-8 introduce us to John the Baptist, sent to prepare the way for Christ, fulfilling the prophecies and promises of the Old Testament

- Verses 9-13 speak to us of the coming of Christ into the world, the light of the world that not all would recognise, but a light that could never be extinguished.
- And finally, verses 14-18 speak to us of the incarnation and salvation, God becoming flesh and the salvation that this would bring those who accepted Him.

John's Gospel is unlike any of the other Gospels and in these opening verses we are offered a real glimpse of just who Jesus is in terms of His relationship with God, of why Jesus came and of what is to come, which is why it is such an important lesson for this time of year.

Remembrance Day Thoughts

We are all very familiar with the poem "In Flanders Field" by Lt. Col. John McCrae, written after the Battle of Ypres in 1915.

In Flanders Fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place, and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved. And now we lie
In Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders Fields.

In 1917, on hearing of the death of John McCrae, R.W. Lillard wrote "America's Answer".

Rest ye in peace, ye Flanders dead
The fight that you so bravely led
We've taken up. And we will keep
True faith with you who lie asleep,
With each a cross to mark his bed,
And poppies blowing overhead.
When once his own life-blood ran
So let your rest be sweet and deep
In Flanders Fields.

Fear not that ye have died for naught;
The torch ye threw to us we caught,
Ten million hands will hold it high,
And freedom's light shall never die!
We've learned the lesson that ye taught
In Flanders Fields.

I have found a third answer, entitled "In Canadian Fields" By Floyd Zurbrigg, the sentiments of which I feel must have found resonance with all those left at home both then and now.

In Flanders Fields the poppies grow When I hear that famous poem I know That our soldiers went to a far off shore And gave their lives in an awful war. I'm aware of the hardships they endured So our peace would be assured. But the poem that I can never find Tells the stories of those left behind. Of wives and sweethearts, kissed at the train That never saw their men again. Of parents, brothers and sisters too Who worried, because they never knew If their soldier was alive or dead. Many tearful, heartfelt prayers were said. To the ones at home, we owe a debt, They suffered too, let's not forget. While in Flanders Fields, the poppies grew The folks at home were heroes too.

Christmas Past — Christmas Present

Once upon a time Scotland was a very different place from what it is now. Very many country people lived in poor housing with a closet in the back garden. If the man of the house was out of work the family suffered as the only benefit (the Dole), from the Parish Council, was a pittance. If a member of a family "on the Dole" was seen to buy something that wasn't deemed a necessity, the Dole would be stopped. Most families then lived on broth, made from the cheapest cut of beef and vegetables from the garden. Obesity was unheard of. The only meat many families had was rabbit which could have been snared (illegally) or acquired from the local Poacher who had a steady trade for his ill-gotten gains which he sold for a few pence.

The little village school I attended was wonderful with its earth playground. We had games for all seasons but I look back on the skipping rope time as my favourite and still remember the rhymes we sang—"Polly in the kitchen, doing some stitchin'in comes a bogey man and out goes she". Then there was "House to let apply within, lady goest out for drinking gin. Gin you know is a very bad thing so out goes(Margaret) and (Betty) comes in".

There was a crochet season—how we envied the older girls with their huge multi coloured blankets—and when the weather was good we went exploring for wild flowers and hidden treasure. We found the former but never the latter! We had much more freedom then but cars and paedophiles were thin on the ground so we were quite safe.

I lived near the school so went home for lunch, which we called dinner in those days, but some children lived quite a way off and as there were no school meals then, they brought what was known as a 'piece' - a large hunk of bread and jam without butter for butter and jam was considered by our elders to be a bit of a luxury and unnecessary even although the jam soaked into the bread.

In those far off days we regularly had Bible Studies. The very few Catholic children left the class-room but we accepted this and felt sorry that they were missing the Bible stories we loved. We never tired of hearing about the baby Jesus who was born in a stable, wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger. The Wise Men, the Star of Bethlehem, the Angels and Mary and Joseph were very real to us and we looked forward from one year to the other for baby Jesus's birthday. Christmas was a wonderful time.

Of course we loved the parties and the delightful goodies which came in a paper poke (bag). In those days children rarely were given bought cakes and buns and the contents of the poke was a super treat and a great change from the girdle and potato scones which were the usual fare, baked at home on the big kitchen range.

At school we worked hard making decorations from crepe paper which we cut into fringes with very blunt scissors. We thought they made our classroom look absolutely beautiful. At school parties we sat at our desks and played games and sang carols which I still love— Away in a Manger—Silent Night—Once in Royal David's City. We loved our parties and we loved the baby Jesus whose birthday we were celebrating. Presents in those days were few, for money was not plentiful, but we were happy.

I grew up firmly believing the words of the Hymn "God is Always Near Me", which in later years was a great comfort to me when making my way home alone, on pitch black nights, during the black-out of World War II for I knew He could see me just the same as by mid-day light.

Christmas has changed greatly now with political correctness resulting in the Red Cross Charity shops no longer selling Christmas cards or having a Christmas display. 'Plastic' has allowed people to buy things they can't really afford and has replaced the need to save for a coveted item. Most young people have everything money can buy although 'time' and 'love' can be in short supply in many of their lives.

We have become a materialistic society encouraged constantly by the media to buy more and more. I wonder how many young people know what is written in Mathew 6 verse 24—'You cannot serve God and mammon'. (Mammon can now be interpreted as the 'idol of materialism').

The question isHow many of our young and not so young people look forward to Christmas as the celebration of the birth of Jesus and now many will live happily ever after?



Abbey Church Fabric

The major business over the last couple of months has been the replacement of the boiler for the heating system: this was completed successfully on schedule during the autumn break in children's activities, and the two large boilers installed some 18 years ago have been replaced by a smaller more efficient one that produces the same output as the two combined. At the same time the new flue replaced the two old incorrectly positioned ones, and an automatic safety gas cut-out system was included.

Meanwhile, we have been looking at the recommendations of the fire safety report prepared earlier in the year, with a view to putting them into effect, and whilst they cannot be all achieved in one fell swoop, the most important will start being seen over the next few months. Emergency lights in the church area are in hand, emergency exit signage will also appear shortly, and the back door will be altered to open outwards so that it can be used safely in an emergency. A ramp for wheel chair use at the kitchen door exit is also being investigated.

After all that, a fire alarm system is the major undertaking, and prices and recommendations are currently being sought - a system of light beams across the church body looks the optimal choice.

The church insurance company inspector recently called to check the state of the building, and raised no concerns. He was of course pleased to hear of the fire safety plans.

Members might be interested to know that we are required now to have annual certificates to show we have portable electrical appliances, gas equipment, and fire extinguishers checked, which does involve annual costs. We are also due a 5-yearly fixed electrical wiring check which will be done in January.
