

Door Lock

For security reasons, it has been decided to change the lock on the door (at the Session House entrance), and this will be done on 1st March. The Kirk Session has approved a list of keyholders who will be given keys, but a condition will be applied that loss of a key will mean paying for a new lock and set of keys, as a lost key will mean we cannot be sure the building is secure. It will not be possible for the new keys to be copied without permission.

Stonework at the South Door

Two stones in the arch over this door have moved slightly, but are not at risk of falling, but one stone at the side has broken and a piece fallen off. A local surveyor has kindly examined the damage and recommended an experienced stonemason, who has come and inspected, and will be sending a list of suggested work and a quotation. His verbal comments were that the problem was not too serious, nor the work extensive.

Dear Friends,

There are many privileges in a minister's life and I was accorded such on the 15th January when I had the duty of officiating at the funeral of our dear departed friend Peter Alan Barker, a loyal Ruling Elder of Coupar Angus Abbey and a friend to many. Peter had the intention of becoming a minister in the Church of England, having been born and brought up in Kent, but felt a greater call to teaching. Having graduated with a "double first" from Cambridge University he enjoyed the challenge of teaching at Eton College - where he taught pupils of many famous parents, including royalty and senior politicians. Keen to progress in the field of education, he took up an appointment at Strathallan School in Perthshire where "their discipline was fantastic, far better than at Eton"!

Peter eventually took up residence in Blairgowrie in 1991 and having "tried" a few of the local churches decided that the Abbey in Coupar Angus should be his spiritual home and was ordained there as a Ruling Elder. And he was very certain that he was in the right place.

Certainty is the most valuable thing in the world and the one note which all will recognise in someone who preaches or speaks in Jesus' Name - as Peter did - will recognise the sincerity of belief.

The man who clearly knows where he is going, and who has no doubt that he is right, is the man with real strength. One strong man who is sure of himself will carry a whole committee with him. The man to whom others will listen, and the man who gets things done, is the man who obviously knows what he is talking about. Peter always gave the impression that he knew a great deal (and he did!), He was also able to have the last word on many occasions - and has managed to have that even in the Isla Link.

But he also made a final request - nay it was a command - and these were the words I was able to include in my eulogy in Church.

MISS ME BUT LET ME GO

When I come to the end of the road And the sun has set for me. I want no rites in a gloom-filled room Why cry for a soul set free?

Miss me a little but not too long And not with your head bowed low, Remember the love that we once shared Miss me but let me go.

For this is a journey we all must take And each must go alone, It's all part of the Master's Plan A step on the road to home.

When you are lonely and sick at heart, Go to the friends we know, And bury your sorrow in doing good deeds Miss me, but let me go.

We will - and we'll miss Peter - and thanks be to God who will have welcomed him with the words; "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter into your rest".

EPACTS

Before Christmas Helen Pithie asked if I would participate in the January EPACTS Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, a role previously covered by Peter Barker. Since my 25 years of ordained ministry have all been ecumenically based I was happy to oblige.

This year's theme for the East Perthshire Action of Churches Together in Scotland was 'Salt of the Earth' but the World Council of Churches booklet was only a general guide so the various acts of worship were non-conformist! Daily meetings were held in different local venues & organised/led by different denominations. Thursday 21st was 'our' abbey day, & a group of us duly went to Blair, meeting in the parish church hall. More importantly, fellowship followed each service with soup & blether. Thanks girls....

I had gone along the day before, to meet another church representative & finalise our joint service. John Mowat gave me some helpful if rather confusing advice regarding the structure of our contribution - but then I was new to the task. The service started with symbolic lighting of candles by Helen, one for each church represented on the day. John talked about Joseph's dream after a reading from Genesis and we sang 'I have a dream'. I talked about stewardship after a reading from 1 Peter, reminding me of my commitment to educational chaplaincy and crop science. We sang 'God in his love for us' before finishing with prayers, 'Angel voices', a blessing and soup!

It's very difficult for me to even begin to grasp the idea of a common Christian vision & mission in Perthshire, let alone what it must be like to be a witnessing Christian in Latvia under an oppressive neighbouring Russian regime and a Cold War godless atmosphere. The EPACTS week reminds us of the need for unity & mission throughout a bigger world than our local parishes. Check out Mathew's gospel for a take on salt and light.....I found myself reflecting on how God has led me to develop chaplaincy roles alongside my workplace, founded on my personal commitment to Justice Peace and the Integrity of Creation. What gifts have you been given to bring others to Christ?

During the '90's I was employed by the Anglicans as their Education Officer in Greater Manchester, as chaplain to educational chaplains, under the umbrella of Greater Manchester Ecumenical Council. As you might expect in a huge metropolis, their ecumenical vision was different from the kirk here, for many reasons - historical, geographical, cultural, political & theological. It was similar to the industrial West Riding of my childhood - Jeff Brewer and I are both Bradford boys!

Before that I had also played an ecumenical role as a minister in secular employment, alongside lecturing my agricultural and horticultural students. Local Methodist & Anglican ministries also contributed to my URC background, via York Ecumenical Council. The last 11 years before my retirement were also spent in chaplaincy, at the King's School Canterbury - well known to Peter. This Anglican foundation entrusted me with ecumenical & interfaith stewardship despite my Presbyterian & congregational roots. On the other hand I did run the tuck shop and bar! My leaving present was a lovely silver sporran hip flask, engraved with 'the spirit of stewardship', which I find essential for ceilidhs....

Perhaps you will now understand why I am enjoying my role as Woodland Willie at Butterybank. Working with 'my' P7's from Coupar Angus Primary School continues to be a constructive community link beyond the woodland. So much for retirement. That's my vision. What's yours?

Ken McGregor - 25.10.19-13.12.16

Ken McGregor and identical twin David were born in Coupar Angus on 25th October 1919. He had two older sisters, Rosa and Christina, and also a brother, James, who died before Ken was born. Despite the friendly banter between Ken and David there was always a strong bond between the twins which lasted throughout their lives until David died three years ago.

Ken married local girl Jean Murray in 1950 and were blessed with three sons, Murray born in 1955, Kenneth born in 1957 and Gordon in 1961. The family moved to Denrosa, Bogside Road in 1959 where Ken was to remain for the rest of his life and from where his bee keeping business was run. He retired in the early 1990's when the business moved to its present location in Victoria Street run by eldest son, Murray. However, although retired he continued to have a keen interest in the business and would quiz Murray about what was happening.

Sadly in 1973 his much-loved Jean was diagnosed with cancer and died in 1974. Ken had a young family still at home and his bee-keeping business to run but he was strongly supported by friends and neighbours who helped him cope.

A few years later he found the loyal companionship of Rosalyn who was a great strength to him and remained a huge part of his life to the end.

In the 17 years I was Ken's elder I became good friends with him and Rosalyn. They always made me very welcome and I loved my visits with them.

They were always very passionate about the garden and greenhouses and what was growing in them or what plans they had for the next season. During most of my visits I was shown into the greenhouse to see what was growing or what had come into flower. Last year the interest was in growing black tomatoes, which certainly looked different and not very appetising but they tasted lovely. Ken always had a wealth of stories to tell and I always came away smiling and clutching something in my hands, be it tomatoes, apples or plants. They were both very generous with their time and the produce they had grown.

The loyal companionship and friendship of Rosalyn greatly enriched the quality of his life and there was a special bond between them. He loved to tell about the car journeys Rosalyn took him on and he especially enjoyed his trips to Alyth for his bridie.

Ken died in PRI on Sunday 13th December 2015 aged 96 with his family and loved ones by his side. I visited Ken in BCH a week before he died and even then he was interested in the Church being decorated for Christmas and we chatted about our families. He loved his family and was very proud of them all.

I shall miss my visits with Ken very much and feel very privileged to have been his elder and friend. He was a very special gentleman, warm-hearted and charming with a mischievous twinkle in his eye. He will be missed very much.

Bendochy Retirement
