


Links

At the start of another new year, I found myself reflecting on the title of our kirk magazine - 'Isla Link' – and realised just how many links we all have, both with each other and our community.

When we retired here over 5 years ago, I discovered there were lots of groups in Coupar Angus with confusing initials. CART, MAD, POP, FCA, CAPS & TT for instance. So I decided to join them all! It has taken me this time to get a grip on what they do. Each group has its own remit and seemed to me to act separately. Gradually these groups are all now beginning to share resources and communicate more effectively. We have started to link together, which is both more effective and more fun.

Getting involved in the different projects has helped me settle in quite quickly, and I have really enjoyed my time spent helping to develop Butterybank Community Woodland in particular. This has involved contributions from several groups including those already listed. Butterybank for instance is a Forward Coupar Angus (FCA!) project but relies heavily on support from Pride of Place (POP!) Make a Difference (MAD!) and Coupar Angus Primary School (CAPS!) in particular.

So where does the Abbey Church and Bendochy link to these various community projects? Well several of us as kirk members are also members of these groups. For instance, Anne Easson is chair of POP with John often alongside helping, as with Jeff Brewer and myself and they have always helped out with Butterybank – where we now have over 600 young trees already planted! The same links also apply to eg Britain in Bloom and Keep Scotland Beautiful, with 4 successive gold awards for the town! Without Allan and Sheila Legge's continual charity shop presence, many of our community groups would be strapped for cash. There are lots of other examples where our linked churches are strongly linked with our communities and I have probably missed out far too many examples of our members' contributions - Snowdrop Festivals, Open doors, markets.....

These links also work in reverse, since several of our school children attending the Children's Ministry sessions (led by our enthusiastic and capable team) have also been helping POP and FCA at school. I have been fortunate to have been granted open access to the school, wearing both my Woodland Willie hat and my ministerial collar. This has given me a stronger link between the kirk and the next generation. All of us have ample opportunities for outreach, representing our commitment to Jesus Christ as God's Son and our Saviour – without having to ram the bible down folks throats!

So there are definite links which have grown over the years - over the 800 years we have had a kirk presence here! I wonder what your own links are? With a new minister settling in very quickly with us, Andy and Margaret are learning about all our various activities. In this exciting and challenging year ahead, we pray that Andy will lead us onwards and upwards to live out our faith both within and without our church buildings. All of us have a contribution to make as we strive to put back a bit of Pride back in our Place. This is our heritage and responsibility.

After all we are only as strong as our weakest link!

Anyone who is even suspected of following Jesus faces imprisonment, torture - or even death.

Yet despite these terrible risks, the church there is enduring - and growing. Hundreds of thousands of North Koreans follow Jesus in secret. Open Doors workers provide these believers with vital aid, and are often their only contact with the outside world. The risks they take are greater than ever, but our prayers and support make their work possible, and show our brothers and sisters in that country that they are not forgotten.

This organ is a late 30's Compton Theatre pipe organ.....very similar to the one I learnt on in Aberdeen. It is a 3 manual /10 rank organ with the art deco "jelly mould" illuminated console surround. This will be fun!

Lastly, I would like to thank the Choir who turn up every Wedneday evening to practice, for their support and enthusiasm. We really are going from strength to strength and attempting more and more adventurous music. It really is great to see what we can achieve.

Bible Study - Abraham

Chapters 12 to 25 in the book of Genesis all recall, to different degrees, the story of Abraham, yet we know very little about him prior to him receiving the call from God. A descendant of Shem, son of Noah, he came originally from Ur, a Sumerian city in the Euphrates valley, in the ancient land of Mesopotamia. (About 450 miles East of Jerusalem and close to where Basra is in Iraq today.) We have this image of Abraham as an honest and upright individual, someone who was dignified and firm in his faith, and who was held in high regard by others. Even in his younger days, before he has his own family, he is something of a Father figure and he was obviously a man who had faith in the God who made heaven and earth. Indeed in religious terms Abraham emerges as the Father figure of all 3 main faiths today - Judaism, Islam and Christianity, but what can we learn from him?

Read Genesis 12:1-9

What is our first impression of Abraham as we are introduced to him in these verses?

• When God called, Abraham responded in faith - no doubts or hesitation - simple obedience.

Read Genesis 16:1-15

How do we think Abraham behaved in these verses - and what lessons can we learn?

- He was acting in accordance with the custom of the day, but was he impatient?
- Indeed, was he more than impatient? Was he showing a lack of faith in his actions here?
- Or was he trusting faithfully in the promises of God that He will act in His own time?

Read Genesis 18:16-33

What do we learn about Abraham from his actions in these verses?

- Was he genuinely concerned about the people in Sodom or was it more a case of him probing to discover just how merciful God was?
- Why would God allow Abraham to question Him in the first place?
- Abraham believed in the power of intercession but he discovered here also how prayer also helps us to better understand the will of God.
- What does this encounter teach us about prayer today?

Read Genesis 20

What do we make of Abraham's actions in these verses?

- No matter how faithful we are or how much we love God, the temptation to sin will still come our way, and we will succumb.
- Furthermore, it is very easy for a sinful action to become a sinful pattern of living.
- Abraham showed a lack of trust in God to work in his favour. He assumed Abimelech would do the worst and so set out to deceive him from doing so.
- God will intervene in our lives when we perhaps least expect Him to do so.

Read Genesis 22

What does this encounter between God and Abraham teach us?

- In these verses we witness one of the greatest acts of faith and obedience in the entire Bible.
- God abhors human sacrifice and would never have let Abraham carry out this act, but wanted to see if in his heart he would have been prepared to do so - He was testing him.
- Abraham was willing to give up his only son for God. God did give up His only Son for us. But what are we prepared to give up for God?

Abraham was a faithful and loyal servant of God. He was respected by others and practised hospitality towards others whenever the opportunity arose. He avoided conflict where possible but when it couldn't be avoided he was willing to let his opponents dictate the rules for settling any dispute. However, under severe pressure, he was liable to 'bend the truth' slightly for his own end. Yet from his life we learn implicitly that God desires genuine dependence, faith and trust in Him, and that if we can live in this way, God will make Himself known to us and bless us abundantly.

Hot Cross Muffins

(adapted from "Muffins, Fast and Fantastic", 3rd ed, by Susan Reimer)

This is a lovely way of using up any jars of mincemeat left after your Christmas baking.

Traditionally, rich fruits, eggs and other sweet things were given up during the period of Lent and so Easter celebrated the return of these delights to our tables through baked treats on Easter Sunday.

Makes 11-12 standard sized muffins

Ingredients:

10 oz (280g) self-raising flour

½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) bicarbonate of soda

½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) salt

3 oz (85g) fine white granulated sugar

1 egg

8 fl oz (240 ml) milk

8 fl oz (240 ml) ready-made mincemeat (about 12 oz/350g)

3 fl oz (90 ml) sunflower oil

3 oz (85g) sultanas

Thin, narrow slices of marzipan to make crosses for the tops

Method:

- 1) Prepare muffin tins (deep pan tins with deep papers to allow muffins to rise correctly). Preheat oven to 375-400°F (190-200°C) for a conventional oven, Gas Mark 5-6.
- 2) In a large bowl, sift together: flour, bicarbonate of soda, salt and sugar.
- 3) In a separate bowl, beat egg with a fork, stir in milk; mincemeat and oil.
- 4) Pour all of liquid ingredients into dry mixture. Stir just until combined, adding the sultanas during the final strokes. The batter will be lumpy, but no dry flour should be visible. Do not over-stir.
- 5) Fill muffin cups three-quarters full. Place marzipan strips across tops of muffins and bake for 20-25 minutes until tops are lightly browned and spring back when pressed gently. Allow muffins to cool for several minutes to make removal easier.

Abbey Church Fabric Report

The Manse.

Andy and Margaret's arrival at the manse after it being unoccupied for so long revealed a number of previously un-noticed problems that needed attention, fortunately only one being major. This latter is the drainage, for the drains quickly became blocked (twice), and although they were cleared with drain rods, there is obviously an underlying problem. A camera investigation checked it was not in the main runs under the paths, which confirmed suggestions that it was connected with an old-fashioned trap near the gate. Estimates are being sought for replacing this, likely to cost several hundred pounds.

Other faults ranged from poor burning of the gas hob (being replaced), a bow in the front door (under investigation), and a leak in the garage roof, to a fault in the security light detector and a burst plastic drain pipe. We're hoping the list is now coming to an end so Andy and Margaret can enjoy everything working properly.

The problem of the church boiler flues not complying with regulations was mentioned in the last Isla Link. However, on checking with the Gas Regulator, it was confirmed that this legislation does not apply to these boilers (though it will when they are replaced).

A gust of wind blowing doors open has broken the glass on the internal Session House door, so this will be replaced with a solid panel as the glass served little purpose. A check on the roof was done, and a number of slates replaced. The lectern microphone cable had deteriorated from getting trapped, and has been replaced (and the lectern moved to minimise the risk of future damage). After the old microphone used by the minister failed, it was replaced, but we are grateful to Keith Langelaan who managed to repair the old one (pronounced by a professional as unrepairable) so it can be held as a spare.

Annual electrical and fire safety checks are due shortly.


