#### **Being Stretched To Our Limits**

I am often asked what my "absolute deadline is" and what that person is really asking is, can my limits be stretched a bit more to accommodate their own needs. It is often said "that you can always ask a busy person to do more" as these people will be well organised and rarely say no, but does that mean that we have the right to ask. Perhaps there are times when we should be offering to reduce their load rather that stretching their limits further.

During our break at the beginning of June, Margaret and I journeyed from the Borders to the Highlands of Scotland and enjoyed our time immensely. In the Borders we visited the ruins of the great Abbeys at Melrose, Kelso, Jedburgh and Dryburgh and we walked along some of the Abbot's Way. In the Highlands we walked around Loch an Eilein, alongside Loch Morlich and even ventured up the Cairngorms.

All different settings and surroundings, all different experiences. However, in all of these there was one common factor - a real sense of peace. Walking through the ruins of the Abbeys it was hard not to pause from time to time and just visualise the Abbots and Monks at work and prayer, and to imagine the sense of peace they would have felt. #### **Bible Study**

The Bible Study group will restart on Wednesday the 26<sup>th</sup> of September at 7.15pm in the Abbey Church. More details will be available in the intimation sheets and on the website in the coming weeks, but all are welcome to come to these informal and friendly meetings where together we look at the Word of God.

#### Bible Study – Hannah from 1 Samuel Chapter 1

#### Background Information :

In the 11<sup>th</sup> century BC the centre for worship for the people of Israel was at a place called Shiloh, which was about twenty miles north of Jerusalem. It was here that the Tabernacle had been erected and here that we would find the Ark of the Covenant. The law stated that every male should come to worship and make sacrifices to God at each of the great feats, which would have been three times a year, although here we are told that Elkanah made this visit annually. When he did this his family would go with him.

Hannah had not given birth to any children and in those days, not only would she have been considered a failure, but also an embarrassment to her husband. Because of this the custom was that Hannah was obligated to give one of her serving girls to Elkanah to bear him children and it may well be that this is who the second wife Peninnah was. Indeed the law stated that Elkanah was quite within his rights to divorce Hannah because of her barren-ness, but not only did he not do so, we are told that such was his love for her that he gave her a 'double portion' at each offering. Despite his rights and the obvious social criticism that he would have received, still Elkanah remained devoted to Hannah.

The chapter itself is nicely split up into three sections, verses 1-7, 8-18 and 19-28 and in each section there are many lessons for us to learn.

#### 1 Samuel 1:1-7

# Given her own and her home circumstances, how do you think Hannah herself might have felt?

- That perhaps God had forgotten about her was it punishment for some sin?
- That perhaps her husband might love Peninnah more than her after all, she could give him children and in that culture this was very important.
- A failure as a woman especially so when taunted by Peninnah.
- Bitter and twisted perhaps, but there is no evidence of that here as of yet.
- Grieved within her heart we are told that she wept each year at the sacrifice.

#### 1 Samuel 1:8-18

# How do these verses give us a greater insight of Hannah, what do we learn of her here?

- Hannah knew her husband loved her, but still that brought her no comfort or consolation.
- In her eyes she had failed him a fact she would have been continually reminded of by Peninnah.
- Hannah had perhaps had good reason to feel discouraged and bitter. She 'shared' her husband with a woman who could give him children and who ridiculed her.
- But instead of retaliating or giving up hope, she takes her problem honestly and openly to God.
- Despite all that she had endured, still she had enough faith to come before God.
- And once she had done so, notice how she at once felt better within herself.

#### 1 Samuel 1:19-28

#### What do we discover about Hannah in these verses?

- Despite the joy that must have been hers in having a son, Hannah remains faithful to her promise to God.
- She keeps him at home until she has weaned him and then gave him up in dedication to the service of God.
- She gave up what she wanted most because she knew that god had listened to and answered her prayer.

#### What can we learn from this story of Hannah?

- In the first section, although we might not be able to keep others from unjustly criticizing us or mocking us, we can choose how we react to their hurtful words.
- Rather on dwelling on self-pity and despondency, we can look forward in hope in God.
- In the second section we are reminded that no matter how discouraged or embittered we might feel, if we take things honestly and openly to God, He will listen to us.
- And in the third section, remember the promises that we make to God in response to His goodness.

#### The Abbey Fabric Report–Under Gallery Development



The development of the church takes another major step forward with the start of work on turning the space under the gallery into a much more useful multi-purpose area, providing a caféstyle room for use on Friendly Fridays and other occasions, as well as a meeting room. There will

be a small sink and hot water facility for this, and the area will be divided in half (crosswise) by a partition to screen off the back half which will still be used for chair storage. Built-in cupboards and shelves will provide better, tidy storage than the present shelving. A glass screen will replace the present red curtain, and should make both the new room and the church lighter.

At the moment the Architect is drawing up final plans which will be submitted to Perth and Kinross Council along with our application for a building warrant, which might take some time. Once this has been received we can start putting the work out to tender. However, all of this will cost a considerable amount - a Quantity Surveyor known to the Architect has estimated between £25,000 - £30,000. Yes, we have some funds available and we will be applying for grants, nevertheless, we will also have to do some fundraising and will be looking for support from the congregation as we do so. More will follow in the coming weeks and months and we will, of course, keep the congregation updated every step of the way. Sketch plans of the work are on show on the noticeboard at the rear of the church.

#### Life And Work – The Magazine Of The Church of Scotland

The number 70 seems to have been cropping up in Life & Work over the summer. In July the focus was on the 70th anniversary of the NHS much lauded in the media. This concept of free healthcare at the point of delivery was absolutely revolutionary after the 2nd World War and did such a lot of good for the health of the nation. Today, there are often negative headlines about our NHS. It is true that it is overstretched and underfunded but it works for the majority. Some of those people share their stories in Life & Work.

The NHS relies on its dedicated workforce of health professionals and many other workers who help to keep the hospitals and clinics running smoothly. One of the allied professions is the Hospital Chaplain who continues to offer care to individuals in their hour of need. This role is explored in Life & Work by Chaplains in post.

In the August issue another, much less covered 70th anniversary is celebrated. The World Council of Churches was founded in 1948 when 147 churches from across the globe met in Amsterdam. Their aim was to unite the life of the Church in shared witness in a world still scarred by war. The quote in the magazine is quite stirring. "We are divided from one another not only in matters of faith, order and tradition, but also by pride of nation, class and race. But Christ has made us His own, and He is not divided. In seeking Him we find one another". The 147 churches has now grown to 350 representing over 550million people in the world.

There are many interesting articles in the magazine of the Church of Scotland. If, like me, you enjoy reading about people's lives, some famous and others quietly doing so much good in a world constantly changing, then order a copy of Life & Work for £2.50 per month.

#### How The EPACTS Calendar Project Began

Sitting at our lounge window, sipping coffee, my husband John and I were discussing in what ways the gospel of Jesus Christ could be promoted in our area.

Suddenly we were both saying at once. "What about a Christian calendar?" We looked at each other in surprise. Was that a coincidence or an inspiration?

Soon we were exploring the idea of an EPACTS (East Perthshire Action of Churches Together in Scotland) committee meeting, suggesting that the local church congregations might use the calendar to send greetings to their friends, relatives and neighbours, and that it would contain Bible texts which would set out the gospel.

The EPACTs folk were cautious, but asked us to form a committee to see how we might take the suggestion further. It was not all plain sailing.

#### Negatives and positives:-

- Aren't there too many calendars already?
- Calendar sales would never cover the costs!
- Postage is too expensive for sending abroad.
- Non-Christians would not appreciate a Christian calendar.

#### The Theme

Our prayers resulted in an emerging theme. The Word of God must be shared with everyone the Church can reach. The Bible says Jesus Himself is "the Word", so Jesus as God's Word became the central theme. He took the penalty for our follies and misdeed by His death, and then, as the risen Christ He offers eternal life to those who accept Him. The calendar should commend Him and His words to everyone who reads it.

#### Photographs

The EPACTS committee took the project to their hearts, and photographs began to arrive. Beautiful pictures really thrilled us, especially when we saw how some could be applied to the appropriate Bible verse and month. Our small calendar committee were helpful in editing and arranging the whole thing, but we were still praying about how it was to be printed, when John Thompson, the new EPACTS representative for St Stephen's Church said that his son, James, worked for a printing firm and could help.

It was mid-October 2017, and I was in Ninewells Hospital recovering from a hip replacement, when the printed calendars arrived, and John brought

some in to me. I was delighted! I offered calendars to fellow patients and to staff members who were looking after me, and all were graciously accepted, and it became a way of talking about faith with a few.

#### 500 Copies

Of the 500 copies printed, only six were spare. We had never intended to make a profit, but because of the Thompsons' generous deal, there was a surplus which will fund the launch of the 2019 Calendar, and perhaps any other evangelistic effort in which EPACTS may be involved. Some used the calendar instead of Christmas cards, some as gifts to other church members; some went inside Christmas hampers to families via the Social Work Department, while others were given to neighbours. We prayed, and still do, that they prove to be an encouragement to Christians, and a challenge to those who have not yet put their faith in Jesus Christ.

#### 2019 Calendar

There were times during 2017 when John and I thought we would never attempt anything like this again, but here we are, planning a 2019 EPACTS calendar. Many good photos have been donated, but we are still not satisfied that we have the right picture for March. The Bible verses are about the Samaritan woman who met Jesus one day when she made her usual journey to the well. (John 4.) I had hoped for a spring-time view of the well site in the Wellmeadow, Blairgowrie. Or are there any other picturesque wells in East Perthshire?

I firmly believe that if God wants something to happen, it will, and I am praying!

#### **Pride of Place**

The Judges, Adrian Miles and Sandy Scott, from Beautiful Scotland came to visit Coupar Angus on the afternoon of Monday 30th July, and Judges, Ally Bruce and Kathy Millar, from Take a Pride in Perthshire came on Thursday,9th August, also in the afternoon. Our aim, always, is to have our town sparkling, a great place in which to live and work. Our displays this year are to celebrate 100 years since the end of the first world war, with white baskets and boxes at the eastern end of town and colourful baskets with purple remembering the animals that died in the war, in the centre of town. At the entrance to Larghan Park there is a bed of poppies in remembrance of the soldiers who fought and died for their countries. The Yarn Stormers have a wonderful display in the Cross in David, the Upholsterer's window of red, white and purple poppies, not to be missed.

All seemed to go well and they seemed suitably impressed, especially the fact that it is so clean and that our baskets have really filled out and grown so big. Well our baskets and boxes are fed with Bill Ronald's secret formula as they are watered which equals beautiful displays. We are also very fortunate in being able to use Ken MacGregor's polytunnel as well as that shared with the school to give the baskets plenty of room to grow before they are ready to be put up. Ian Rodger and his son very kindly gave their time to put the baskets up. We pay to have our baskets and displays watered, as this is very time consuming, by Tom Caldow from Rattray, who does an excellent job and keeps them looking wonderful for the town. That is why it is important that we are able to raise our own funds to add to those we receive from PKC, and are very grateful for the great support we receive from the community in doing this.

PoP does now have its own water bowser but this is very small compared with Tom's. It does mean we no longer have to drive around with containers of water in spring to water the spring displays but we still need a tap to fill it. Saranne Davies has helped us out on a number of times, thank you.

There is a map on the PoP notice board which shows the places we take the Judges. We have only one and a half hours in which to whizz round, but our Judges did spend a lot of time chatting to folk we met which made us late but they were not worried on both occasions.

We were very lucky with the weather, again on both occasions, the sun shone, the bees were buzzing, butterflies flitting, especially in the Pollinator's Bed. We are still working hard to get our wildflower bed at Blair Bend to improve but the weather has not helped this year and trying to water is almost impossible. The Judges gave us some useful tips which of course we will put into practice. Our aim is to get it sustainable, perennials to attract insects and provide colour and interest. We wait now to hear in September how the town has done.
