#### Devotions

**Answered!** Psalm 17:6 (Written by Candace Cameron Bure, Joy and Strength devotional plan.)



I suppose that anyone who prays has done this, but I've sometimes caught myself thanking God for "answered prayer," when what I really meant was, "Thank You, God, for answering the way I wanted!" What I see in Scripture though, is that whenever His sons or daughters pray, God answers; it's just that sometimes it's "no" or "not now" or "this instead" rather than "sure, here you go, child."

This has pushed me to examine myself and my reasons for praying in the first place. And it's been pretty convicting for me, to say the least. Is God solely my divine 999 - my emergency standby - or my Friend whom I take everything to? Am I coming to Him only for His gifts, or to know him better? Do I pray as a spiritual-sounding means of getting what I want, or to truly seek what God wants? And when He does answer, do I trust that He has me covered, no matter the answer?

The difference in my attitude matters more that I want to admit sometimes. And the litmus test is this: I'm actually relating to Him when I not only desire His will above my own, but when I can respond, "I trust You, Lord," to any answer of His.

I repent of being shortsighted in my relationship with You. Draw me deeper and deeper into our Friendship, teaching me to seek You and Your will above all.

*Make Rest Your Friend.* Genesis 2:2-3 (from Finding Rest by YouVersion.)

**Rest** - to relax, pause, breathe, and be at ease.

Rest is a gift that we too easily tend to push aside. But life without rest is not sustainable. Rest refreshes our bodies, giving us the energy we need to honour God and to love others. Learning to practice rest is a spiritual discipline that helps you enjoy God's presence and realign your priorities.

God himself modelled rest for us from the very beginning. Immediately after He finished creating the universe - and everything in it - he gave Himself a day to look back on the goodness of all the work that He had just completed.

**Reflect** - When was the last time you slowed down, unplugged and relaxed? Close your eyes, take a few deep breaths, and think back over your last few days.

#### Leprosy

I have been reading a recently published book on 'Outbreaks and Epidemics' (as you do). It contains a chapter on Covid 19 that I was interested in, but I was surprised to see a section on Leprosy. Perhaps naively, I had assumed that, with modern medicine leprosy was less of a problem nowadays. But I was wrong. I did some digging, so please read on.....

Leprosy was one of the most feared conditions in biblical times and is mentioned multiple times in the Bible. The Hebrew for 'leprosy' was used for various diseases affecting the skin. Priests were responsible for examining a person with a skin blemish, such as a sore or a burn, using Moses' criteria in Leviticus 13: 1 - 46 to decide if the person had a simple rash or a 'defiling skin disease'. If the latter, they would be declared 'unclean' and be sent to live alone, outside the camp. However, if their skin condition recovered the priest had the power to declare them 'clean' in which case they could be readmitted to the camp.

Jesus touched a man with leprosy and healed him, telling him to tell noone, but to go to the priest and offer the sacrifices that Moses had commanded for his cleansing (Mt 8: 2 - 4, Mk 1: 40 - 44, Lk 5: 12 - 14). At this time, it was thought that leprosy was spread by touch, so anyone who witnessed Jesus' action would have been aghast. Later, on his way to Jerusalem, Jesus healed 10 other men with leprosy, again telling them to show themselves to the priests, presumably so they may be declared 'clean' (Lk 17: 11 - 14).

Leprosy was considered a disease caused by sin, particularly lust. It was believed to be contagious, just as sin is considered contagious. In Europe it became epidemic during the dark- and middle-ages. Lepers were shunned and banned from entering any place where there were crowds. They had to carry bells and clappers to alert people of their approach. They lived in isolation or in 'leper colonies' also called Lazar houses. The first Lazar houses were established in the West in the fourth century AD. The Order of St Lazarus was established in Jerusalem in 1098 and was devoted to the care of lepers. Eventually, there were about 19,000 Lazar houses in Europe, the majority established during the 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> centuries following the Third Latern Council of 1179. Lepers were banned from entering a church so most communities had their own chapel, with some attached to monasteries.

But what of today? Sadly, leprosy is still prevalent with over 200,000 new cases every year, which equates to about 600 new cases a day, or one every 2 - 3 seconds! The disease affects adults, children, and infants with cases found in over 120 countries, though about 80% occur in just four countries - Brazil, India, Bangladesh, and Indonesia.

There are two main types of leprosy, 'white' leprosy, and the more serious lepromatous leprosy. It was not until 1880 that the causative agent was identified as a bacterium, *Mycobacterium leprae*, that affects the skin, mucous membranes, and nerves resulting in the development of lumps on the skin with thickening of the skin and nerves. In severe, untreated cases the infection can result in numbness of the skin, muscle weakness, paralysis, deformity, disfigurement, loss of fingers and toes, and a stumbling gait. This was the experience of sufferers in Biblical times and during the following centuries.

In the past it was thought the disease was spread by simple touch alone. But this was wrong as it is now believed that the bacterium is spread via air droplets through coughing or sneezing, and through only <u>prolonged</u> physical contact. The disease has an incubation period of 9 months to 20 years, so people can be infected without knowing it for many years during which time they may be contagious. Fortunately, nowadays, leprosy is treatable with a combination of three antibiotics, the cost of which is met by the World Health Organisation.

Leprosy is curable if caught early and the challenge is to find those infected early so they can be treated. Reconstructive surgery can be helpful for sufferers who have disfigurements. Many health screening programmes are underway across the world and a vaccine is under development.

Leprosy has been around for possibly 4000 years and is one of the oldest diseases affecting humanity. Jesus met lepers 2000 years ago and you might be excused in thinking that leprosy had been eradicated by modern medicine, but you would be wrong, it is very much still with us affecting countless millions of people. The level of physical suffering may be less today than in the distant past but the number of new cases worldwide is still of concern. According to the World Health Organisation, leprosy programmes have been badly affected by the Covid pandemic with fewer new cases being detected in 2020 and a greatly reduced number of sufferers receiving treatment. Hence, the problem has been getting worse and there is much yet to be done to reduce the number of new cases and the burden of suffering.

There are various UK charities devoted to the fight against leprosy. For example, Lepra (Lepra.org.uk), St Francis Leprosy Guild (Stfrancisleprosy.org) and The Leprosy Mission (Leprosymission.org.uk), which is a Christian organisation working in 10 countries in Africa and Asia. If interested, please check out the websites for further information.

Perhaps prayer, increased surveillance, and the development of a vaccine, is our best hope of stamping out this disease in the long term. Finally, watch out for the next World Leprosy Day on Sunday 28th January 2024 for news on progress.

#### Church of Scotland Guild – Changing Lives

Prison Fellowship Scotland is part of a global ministry of reconciliation and Christian outreach to prisoners, ex-prisoners, their families and victims of crime. It is a multi-denominational voluntary organisation offering new life and hope to offenders through trained volunteers, prison teams, prayer support groups and the mobilisation of local churches. With minimal resources, the Charity has been effective, right across Scotland, in taking Christ to men and women behind bars - in worship, reconciliation programmes and befriending. With the Guild's help, these programmes can be expanded; re-offending can be reduced and prisoners can be reintegrated into society --- when Christ changes their lives.

In Perthshire, volunteers from local Churches staff the Visitor Centre at Perth Prison and, in addition to providing refreshments during family visits, also provide hand-made baby blankets, childrens' knitwear and adult hats, scarves and gloves, which prisoners can use as gifts for family members. These items are received with genuine gratitude by the prisoners as many come from backgrounds where gifting may have been a foreign concept.

Should anyone from within the congregations of either Church, or in the local community, wish to make contributions to this programme, I would be happy to receive these and pass them to a local volunteer.
