

From the Interim Moderator (IM)

Presbytery has appointed me, the Rev. Donna Hays, as the Interim Moderator of Bendochy linked with Coupar Angus Abbey for the period of your vacancy. Your previous IM has now moved on to a new post in Blairgowrie. As I only took over at the beginning of April, I would ask for some time to get to know you and what is happening in both Bendochy and Coupar Angus.



A wee bit about who I am...

For the past 20 years, I have been the minister at Fowlis and Liff linked with Lundie and Muirhead and in 2021 I was appointed Interim Moderator at Auchterhouse. The Presbytery Plan however stated that these congregations should unite, and this was achieved in February 2024 with our service of Union taking place in April. So now I am minister of Sidlaw Parish Church of Scotland. The charge currently has three buildings - Auchterhouse, Muirhead and St Marnock's in Fowlis. Sadly, St Marnock's church is due to close by December 2024. We have two services each Sunday using all the buildings on different weeks and quite a number of joint services. A great way of getting to know each other and I'm happy to say that we are all very much invested in being members of Sidlaw Church.

My duties as Interim Moderator include moderating Kirk Session meetings and helping to guide you through the way forward. I hope to be able to come and lead worship on an occasional basis but will also take every opportunity to meet up and get to know you. A vacancy is usually a fairly long drawn-out process and we will not be granted permission to call a minister until the Presbytery have concluded some re-adjustment matters.

This is not an easy time either for the national church or for local churches, and here at Bendochy and Coupar Angus Abbey, you are also now in a vacancy. So I make a special plea - please be prepared to work together, supporting and encouraging one another, especially your Office Bearers who will inevitably be undertaking extra duties during the vacancy. Please look out for any ways in which you can be of service in helping your church to continue to show God's presence and to proclaim God's message both within the church and in your local community.

It is only with God's help that we can do anything well, so place your trust in God who blesses us with strength in adversity, comfort in times of trouble, vision in times of change and love at all times.

May you all know God's grace and peace in abundance.

Following the Rev Andrew Graham leaving us as Minister of Coupar Angus Abbey Linked With Bendochy Parish Church at the end of 2023, we can now advise that both Kirk Sessions are currently being guided by the Rev Donna Hays, who will act as Interim Moderator until a new Minister is appointed.

The Kirk Sessions were sad to receive notification of Andy's wish to relinquish his post, but fully understood that the health and happiness of both he and his family must be his paramount concern.

Members of both Kirk Sessions would like to re-iterate the messages of thanks and best wishes sent to Andy before his departure. Throughout his tenure, Andy supported the members of both congregations and delivered services, including the Christmas Carol service (and who can forget him leading the congregation's rendition of 'the 12 days of Christmas'). Andy led Bible Study Classes, Prayer Groups and Session Meetings; transferring these to Zoom during the Covid-19 Pandemic, and posted online Reflections on the church website to help keep our spirits up during this difficult time. Andy was instrumental in successfully securing grants to set up the Abbey Gateway, which as one Elder stated, is his legacy. Andy was also involved in setting up the monthly Friendly Friday afternoons at the Abbey Church where members of the community continue to attend for a social gathering, enjoying a chat with tea/coffee and tasty bites.

Andy responded to the messages and gifts he had received with a Thank You card which was read out at a Sunday Service in the Abbey in December. This card is posted on the Abbey's notice board and is reproduced here for those who were not at that particular service.

Blessed Assurance

"Blessed Assurance, Jesus is mine! Oh, what a foretaste of glory divine! Heir of salvation, purchase of God Born of His spirit, washed in His blood."

These words were written by Fanny Crosby in 1873. But, who was Fanny Crosby?

She was born in 1820 in New York state and was raised by her mother and grandmother as her father died when she was about 6 months old. Fanny had problems with her vision from the age of just a few months and at the age of three her mother was told that nothing could be done and Fanny would be blind for the rest of her life.

Fanny never allowed her blindness to burden her. Fanny's mother and grandmother schooled her in Christian values, lifestyle, and principles. Fanny started memorising Bible passages at around ten years of age, learning chapter after chapter, book after book. She started writing poetry at around eight years of age, and then hymns.

In 1873 Fanny was visiting her friend Phoebe Knapp. Mrs. Knapp played a tune she had just written and asked Fanny what the tune said to her. Fanny immediately said "Blessed Assurance, Jesus is mine" and proceeded to write the rest of the hymn. This lady who had no memory of ever seeing anything wrote "Visions of rapture now burst on my sight". She went on to say "Watching and waiting, looking above, filled with His goodness, lost in his love." The whole hymn is filled with faith and a happiness that our future is secure in Jesus.

Fanny Crosby wrote thousands of hymns including: "To God Be The Glory" "Praise Him, Praise Him, Jesus our Blessed Redeemer" and "I Am Thine O Lord".

Fanny never described herself as a poet or a writer of hymns, rather she said, she had done mission work. She died in 1915. In 1975 she was posthumously admitted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame.

Pick a number any number?

I'm sure we all have our favourite hymns but how are they chosen for our Sunday service? Does the Minister or person leading the service just choose their favourites or open a hymn book and select a hymn at random. Recently, along with two other Elders from Abbey Kirk I attended a course held over three days to learn how to put together a service of worship should our Kirk need extra help in covering Sunday services.

Little did I, possibly we, know what we were letting ourselves in for! After the first full day I was left in no doubt. Having gained a little, though mind boggling tour of the time line of the Old and New Testaments, we embarked upon how to set about pulling together a theme for a service based upon the timing of the service in the Christian calendar, an event, a specific or chosen scripture(s), or season. Easy? No! First, choose which bible you are going to use. Stick with what is familiar or try something new? How about a bible written in Scots? Maybe try the Doric version, or a street version? The choice is vast.

The worship section on the Church of Scotland website provides an amazing starting point to finding out just how wide the choice is. Within these pages also lies the lectionary. This is a brilliant starting point or even the complete guide for a service on any Sunday of the year if you prefer to follow a more prescriptive route to preparing your service. The lectionary provides suggestions for sermons/reflections, hymns, and prayers. It also provides the more adventurous of us with hyperlinks to all sorts of resource ideas. WARNING: this, however can lead you down a path that takes you into the wee, sma' hours, at the end of which you still haven't written much because you have become so distracted!

Week one done we were sent on our way to think about prayers and hymns for the next study day with our homework set of course!

This was where the fun really began. There is a wealth of resource available online and in books **about** prayer. There are, of course, certain rules to follow. No surprise there then but, are prayers written or chosen at random? They need to be relevant to what is happening in our own community at the time. Is it a special time of year? Is there a major event happening in our world that needs our support in prayer? Perhaps a war, a disaster, or death of a world leader? Prayers should also reflect the message of the chosen scripture, ask for forgiveness, mercy, help and convey thoughts for others who are ill, struggling to survive or oppressed. The list is long.

Having prayers sorted, we now turned our attention to hymns, and or psalms. Now, if I thought prayers presented a challenge, choosing hymns took me to another level! More wee, sma' hours in searching, and in deep contemplation! The trick here is to know what is at the back of your hymnary. The indexes which, to be honest, I have paid very little attention to in the past can help direct you to hymns, psalms and other things musical through indexed subject entries listed under headings such as 'topical', 'biblical', 'tunes', 'composers or arrangers'. Have a wee look the next time you get your hands on a CH4 hymnary; it is fascinating. A bit geeky, but fascinating.

Having bamboozled us all with the above over the two study days that we had so far survived, we were paired up into 8 teams and sent away with the task of compiling our first service of worship to a theme and scripture readings set by the course organisers and examiners. All we had to do was bring all the aforementioned elements together in a service that we would deliver to the course leaders and fellow course members. We were also asked to provide our service in a powerpoint presentation. The final study day saw us all sit through eight services! Everyone rose to the challenge and peer support was plentiful and encouraging. The services differed in the style and content demonstrating the variety of ways in which worship can be delivered.

Overall, the course was a very enjoyable experience demonstrating the complexity and intricacies involved when creating the 'jigsaw' of a service, so that all the elements fit together. Finally, I obtained a new appreciation of the work involved by our ministers and all those who deliver our Sunday services. It was fun, and I gained a lot from it but, I may think again before volunteering for yet another role within our Kirk!
